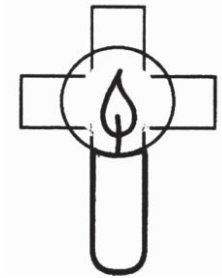

The vicar writes.....

Dear Friends,

A couple of weeks ago, as part of the usual Epiphany-tide readings, we heard again the account of the Baptism of Jesus. Epiphany means "appearing" or "revealing." The account of Jesus's baptism, amongst the other stories of Epiphany - the wise men bringing their three gifts, Jesus turning water into wine - is probably the most obvious in terms of revealing who Jesus is. It is certainly the most public, and you get an actual statement from heaven: "This is my beloved son, in him I am well pleased".

Surely that public reassurance from his heavenly Father sustained him in the solitary desert struggle that followed.

This month we too turn from Epiphany into Lent, (and with an early Easter, there isn't much time between the two!). How might our own experiences of revelation sustain us during this time?

In preaching about the baptism of Jesus a couple of weeks ago, I spoke of the Celtic Christian idea of a 'thin place' - *'places where the boundary between the mundane and the eternal becomes permeable. God parts the curtain, and we catch glimpses of his love, majesty, power and glory'*. I talked about there being many faithful Christians who would feel that they have never had a sense of a particular revelation of God, or the presence of Jesus. This is OK! Jesus himself said to Thomas - "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed".

But there are people among us who have had some kind of experience of a 'thin place' or of special help at a time of real need or other sense of a particular revelation of God in their lives.

On that day in church a couple of weeks ago, I invited people to share any experiences they may have had, not knowing what might happen, or if anyone would offer to share something with everyone else. But in both congregations I was at that morning, people did share. And it was such an encouragement.

As we move this year from the extraordinary revelations of Epiphany-tide back into the ordinary, and then the desert of Lent (as Jesus moved from his baptism into his wilderness experience) perhaps we could share some of our extraordinary stories, or our special moments to encourage one another in the desert. We could do that as we meet each other on Sundays or for our mid-week activities, or indeed on the pages of this magazine!

God bless you on your Lenten pilgrimage this year - may there be springs of encouragement and revelation in the desert.

WOMEN'S WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

(INTERNATIONAL AND INTERDENOMINATIONAL)



Receive children. Receive me.



Women's World Day of Prayer is an international, ecumenical, prayer movement that invites women, from a different part of the world each year, to prepare a worship service through which their hopes and fears for their country may be brought before the whole world in prayer.

On Friday 4 March an estimated 3 million people in over 170 countries and islands will gather to observe the day of prayer, using an order of service written by Christian women in Cuba and translated into over 60 languages and 1000 dialects. In the British Isles alone over 6,000 services will be held. The day begins as the sun rises over the island of Samoa and continues until it sets off the coast of American Samoa, some 35 hours later.

The theme 'Receive children. Receive me' reflects St Mark's Gospel, chapter 10 verses 13-16, which is the focus of the service and a reminder that everyone is a child of God and equally worthy of our love and respect.

The Republic of Cuba is the largest Caribbean island, located at the entrance of the Gulf of Mexico and called 'the Key to the Gulf'. Politically at odds with the USA, Cuba suffered greatly due to the economic embargo imposed upon it in 1960 but has found strength within itself to move on and overcome many of its problems.

“So this is a perfect opportunity to say a heart-felt thank you to you all for showing me such kindness and generosity during my all-too-brief stay in Gloucestershire.

Parish and School Partnerships: Working together to worship, serve and celebrate.

As two co-located Christian communities, when working well, the interdependence of church and school can become central to the life-blood of the local community.

Fundraising for the Mid-Wyedean Churches

Last week saw the inaugural meeting of the Fundraising Committee for the Mid-Wyedean Churches set up to co-ordinate and think of ideas for whole parish fundraising.

As some of you may be aware the Parish is struggling to meet its financial commitments of Parish Share and running and maintenance costs just through our regular giving.

We had a shortfall in last year's budget and only managed to pay our promised amount of parish share by dipping into our savings. The shortfall was partly due to the fact that we didn't raise as much money through fundraising events as we had hoped for and put in the budget.

Obviously we don't want it to be all about money but we do need to be able to pay our way.

So the new Fundraising Committee met last week with this in mind and discussed how we could go about raising more money through fundraising events.

The committee is made up of a cross section of people from across the parish with representatives from most churches. The idea of the committee is not that it should do all the work at all the fund raising events but should come up with ideas and facilitate groups of people to take on small fundraising events and bring people together from across the parish to help at the larger fundraising events. They will also co-ordinate all fundraising efforts across the parish to ensure there are no clashes and will obviously help out at events too.

The committee will be overseeing whole parish fund raising where 100% of money raised goes to the parish. The same policy will apply as before that when individual churches have their own local events for specific fund raising purposes 50% will go to the local church and 50% to parish funds.

It is intended to have 3 big fund raising events this year:

- Parish Flower Festival at Staunton over the weekend of 30th/31st July
- Open Garden and Craft Fair at Jane MacBean's house on Saturday 27th August
- Festival of the Nativity and Christmas Crafts at All Saints Newland – Date to be confirmed but probably late November.

We would like to intersperse these with smaller events across the parish throughout the year kicking off with a Shrove Tuesday pudding evening on 9th February – this is donations only for the first one, this will be followed by another one in the autumn on the 11th October where we will also be selling recipe books for the puddings served at both pudding evenings – both these events are being held at the Good Shepherd.

It was also proposed that we have:

- 2 x Beetle drives
- 2 x Bingo nights
- 2 x Quiz nights
- 1 x Concert

And this is where we need your help. We are looking for individuals or groups of people who will be happy to take one of these ideas and organise the event. If you would like to be involved and think you can organise an event can you please see a member of the committee or contact Jean Smith.

Staunton and District Gardening Club

We welcomed John Flynn as our speaker this month and he introduced us to a selection of bird calls and lots of interesting information some of which follows:

In the UK there are about 10,000 bird types, approximately half of which are songbirds.

These songbirds have a pharynx which is split into two and used in conjunction with their lungs to produce song. If the song is slow the bird is using long wavelengths and if it is quick the bird is using short wavelengths rising and falling simultaneously. The males are the main songbirds, for courtship, as the females find a good voice particularly attractive! Birds also make alarm calls but whereas song depicts bird type, alarm calls are recognised by most species. Bird songs are learned and calls are instinctive. Ground nesting birds can communicate from inside their eggs and arrange to "break out" one after the other. Birds lay large clutches of eggs because 20-30 percent of birds do not make it through the winter.

The theory that bird song is greater earlier in the day, "the dawn chorus" could be because the air is heavier at that time and sound travels further. Islands are an interesting habitat, for instance on Skomer the Manx Shearwater feeds out at sea but on return is dive bombed by the Puffins looking for a free meal. Birds can mimic to defend and impress. One much publicised sight in this area is the murmuration of Starlings down by the Severn. Do make a note to see this amazing sight if you have not done so already.

HYMNS

When you come to church you hear hymns. Hymns are songs of praise to God. Some are very old and some, like the ones you may sing at school, are new.

Have you ever wondered who wrote the hymns we sing? For example, one hymn writer was Mrs Cecil Frances Alexander, the wife of the Bishop of Londonderry. She wrote a book called 'Hymns for Little Children' which was dedicated to her godchildren. The book was published in 1848 and contained hymns that we know well today; 'All Things Bright and Beautiful', 'Once in Royal David's City' and 'There is a Green Hill Far Away'.

It is said that she wrote the last hymn because of the view from the Bishop's palace. The house looked out over the city walls to the green hills in the distance.

So the words we sing today come from the view that Mrs Alexander had from her window.



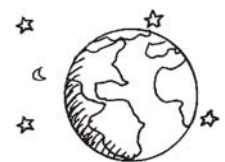
